Awards and Honors

Each year, we two special awards for outstanding students. Each of these players receive an individual plaque and have their name added to our team award board. The awards will be given at our 10th annual fall tournament in New Holland.

MOST IMPROVED PLAYER: An active player with at least one year of tournament experience and a regular non-provisional rating is eligible for this award. In 2018, our most improved player award goes to **Daniel Bright-Walck** of our Elizabethtown club. Dan improved 230 points since January of this year.

MOST DEDICATED PLAYER: Our most dedicated player is given yearly to a player who works hard at his game, helps others, and attends many of our tournaments and clubs and fairs. This year, congratulations goes to **Craig Hinkley** our winner for 2018. Craig plays in both the Berks Suburban and Lancaster Clubs. Craig received over 50 hours of club instruction and has participated in 14 tournaments, including two national and one state championship.

Coaches' Corner



Learning Chess Notation by Mr. Wood


In order to study a game, it is important to record moves in writing. Not only is this a good learning experience, but it is required in all tournaments. There are many ways to record, but algebraic notation is the most popular. In all notation, white and black moves are recorded unless either player has less than 5 minutes on the clock.

1. Each piece is represented by a capital letter.
K= King, Q=Queen, N=Knight, B=Bishop, R=Rook.
A pawn is designated by no letter at all.
2. The square a piece moves to is designed by a small letter and number represented by a grid. (Example Bd4)
3. When capturing a piece, use an "x". (Example Bxd4)
4. Castling is recorded as "0-0-0" or "0-0".
5. A "+" symbol is for check, "#" is a symbol for mate.

Here is an example of a notation:

1. e4 e5 2. Nf3 f6 3. Nxe5 fxe5 4. Qh5+ Ke7
5. Qxe5+ Kf7 6. Bc4+ d5 7. Bxd5+ Kg6 8. h4 h5
9. Bxb7 Bxb7 10. Qf5+ Kh6 11. d4+ g5 12. Qf7
Qe7 13. hxg5+ Qxg5 14. Rxb5# 1-0
